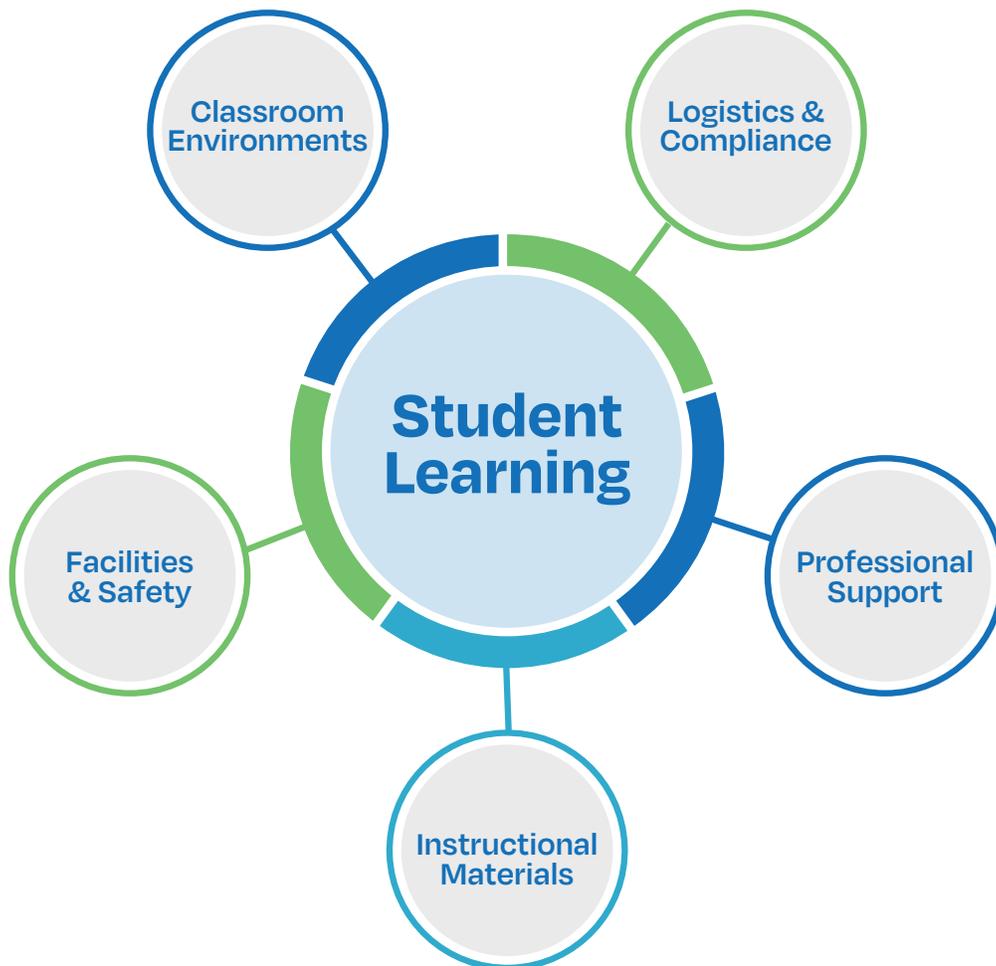


Introduction

The Problem with Traditional Procurement

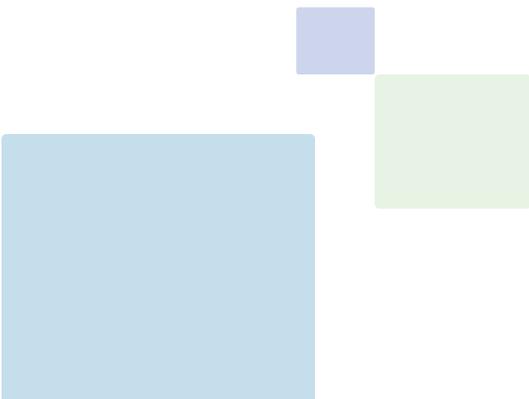
Buying for schools is a strategic function that can directly affect instructional quality and even student safety. But many districts fall back on a transactional model, often leaning on retail giants. These sources feel convenient, but they also create hidden costs beyond money.

The “Big-Box” Paradox

It’s easy to understand the appeal of online or big-box retailers. However, their approach tends to be more transactional than consultative, and their products are often geared toward general consumers rather than to the specific needs of institutions. The paradox is that the price tag might look lower upfront with a retailer, but the hidden costs of mismatched products and quick breakage stack up quickly.

Another misconception is that an item’s line-item price tells the whole story. While one item may look less expensive, only a true partner can help identify ways to bundle products and leverage volume discounts to reduce the overall cost—a service automated retail carts cannot provide. And with many major retailers now relying on algorithm-driven, dynamic pricing, the “deal” a district sees one day may quietly disappear the next, creating uncertainty for budgeting and reorders. A focus on initial price overlooks the Total Cost of Ownership (TCO), which includes all subsequent costs like repair, maintenance, and disposal. [TCO](#) analysis is crucial for uncovering subtle, indirect costs that ultimately determine the true economic value of a purchase.

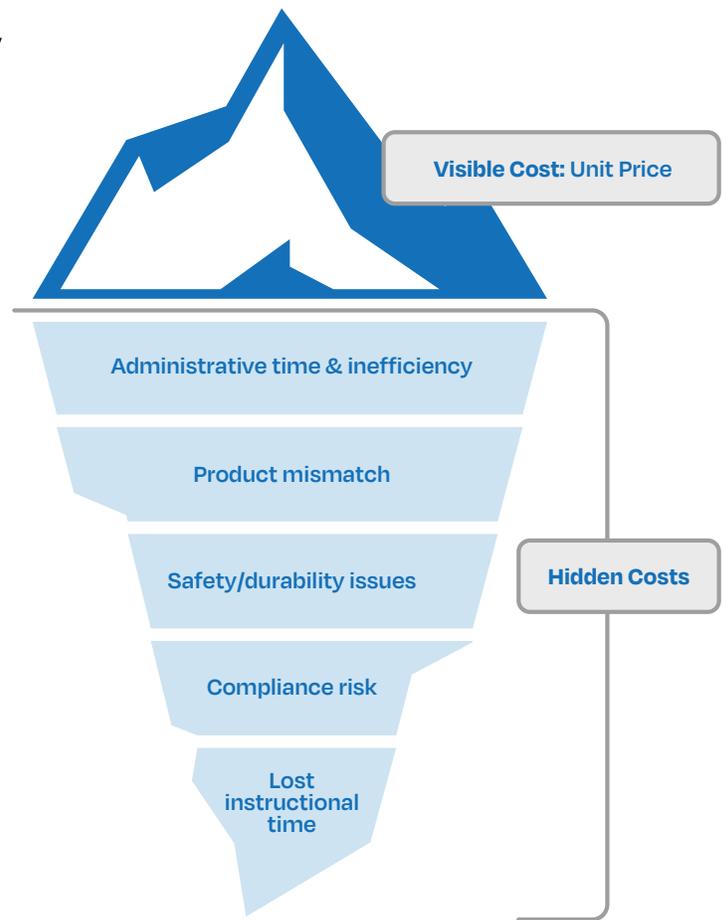
What schools really need is an “education-first” approach: one that emphasizes learning outcomes, specialized product fit, and spaces designed specifically for education. Let’s look at some of the issues with a purely transactional approach.



The Hidden Costs

A transactional model may look less expensive on paper, but in reality, it brings a host of indirect expenses:

- **Administrative Inefficiency:** Ordering from multiple vendors creates a tangle of RFPs, purchase orders, invoices, and shipments. Already-stretched departments spend huge amounts of time untangling it all, sometimes even pulling in non-procurement staff just to keep things moving. School administrative staff spend an average of [15–20 hours per week on procurement tasks](#), an overly time-consuming process that siphons valuable time away from strategic initiatives and student support.
- **Standards-to-Product Mismatch:** Without an experienced partner, it's easy to buy something that just doesn't fit. A generic "word bingo" game might look fine online but turn out to be useless for a specific phonics or vocabulary goal. Teachers are left either adapting the item or abandoning it, wasting money in either case. This mismatch is a key source of waste.
- **Safety and Durability Risks:** Retailers mainly sell consumer-grade products, which aren't built for school settings where supplies are used all day, every day.
 - o **Furniture:** Residential chairs and tables have lower "rub counts" (fabric durability) and are not fire-rated or safety-tested for institutional use. They wear out quickly, or worse, create liability issues. Commercial-grade products are necessary to maximize long-term value and reduce TCO, as they are specifically manufactured to withstand the heavy, daily use of an institutional environment while meeting stringent safety and fire-rating standards.
 - o **Supplies:** Low-cost, low-quality supplies break down quickly, frustrating teachers and students, and forcing schools to reorder more often.



Hidden costs add up quickly when procurement isn't built for schools.

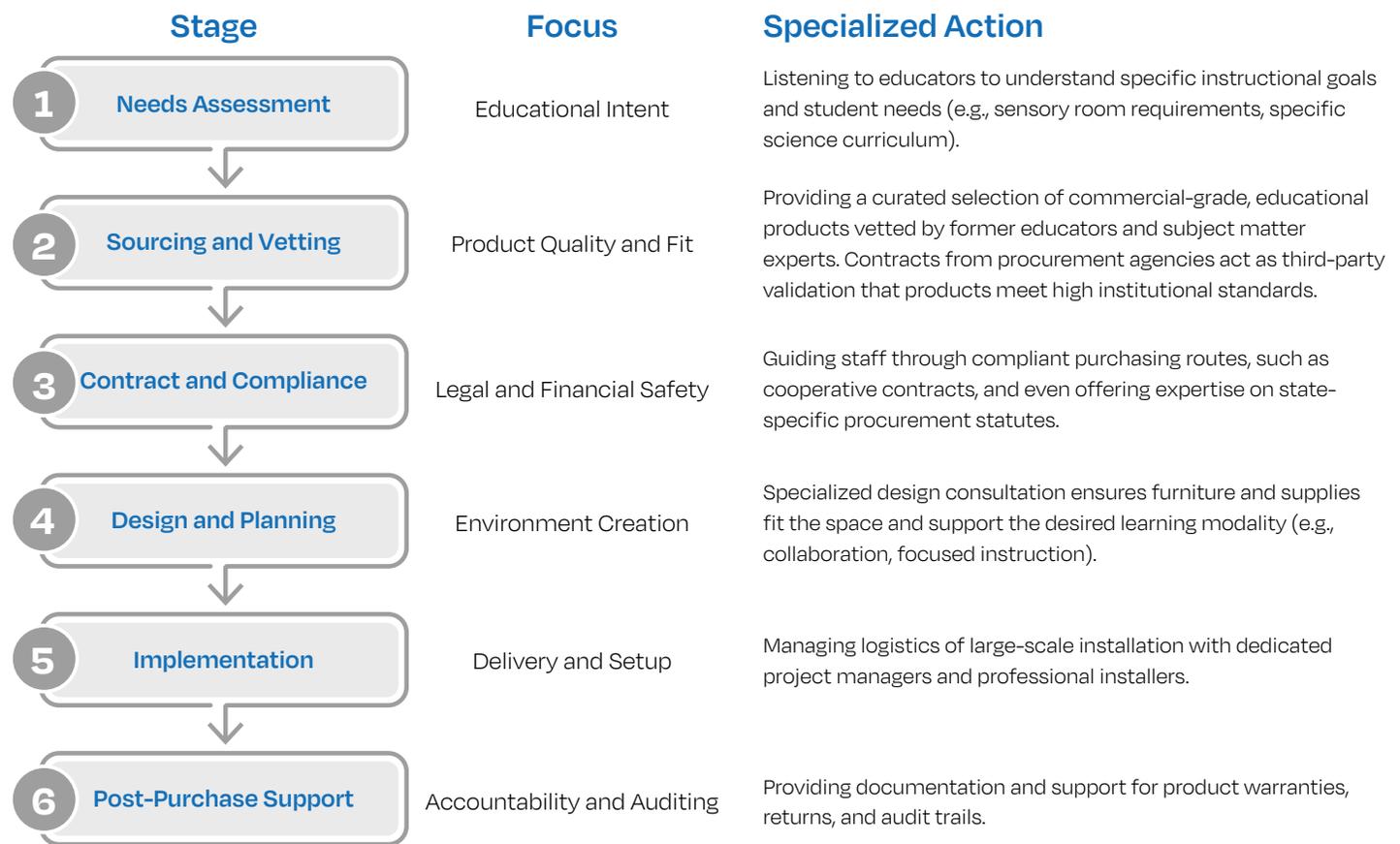
- **Compliance and Audit Vulnerability:** Spreading purchases across multiple non-specialized vendors makes it harder to track spending and ensure compliance with myriad federal, state, and local funding rules and procurement laws. Without a clear paper trail, the district lacks a verifiable record of each purchase for auditing purposes. This becomes a significant liability during the dreaded potential audit of federal and state funds—an increasingly common scenario in today's funding environment.

The End-to-End Procurement Solution: A Model for Education

The alternative to fragmented, transactional purchasing is an end-to-end procurement solution, which transforms a series of disjointed transactions into a coordinated, education-focused strategy. Procurement in schools can feel “overwhelmingly complex,” but the right partnerships can centralize and streamline the process in ways that really matter.

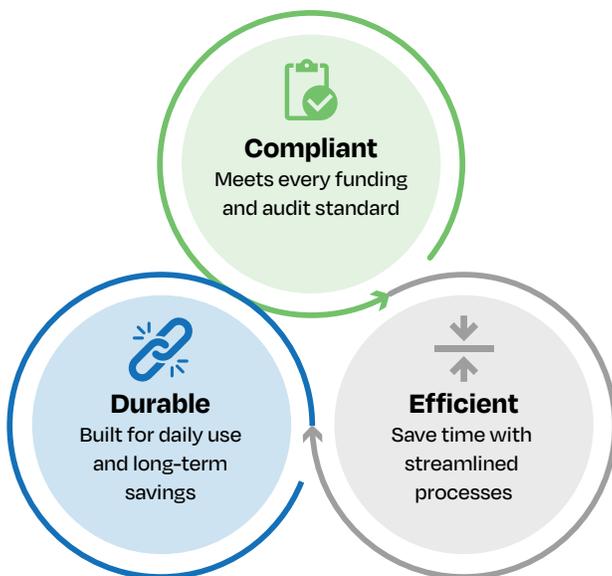

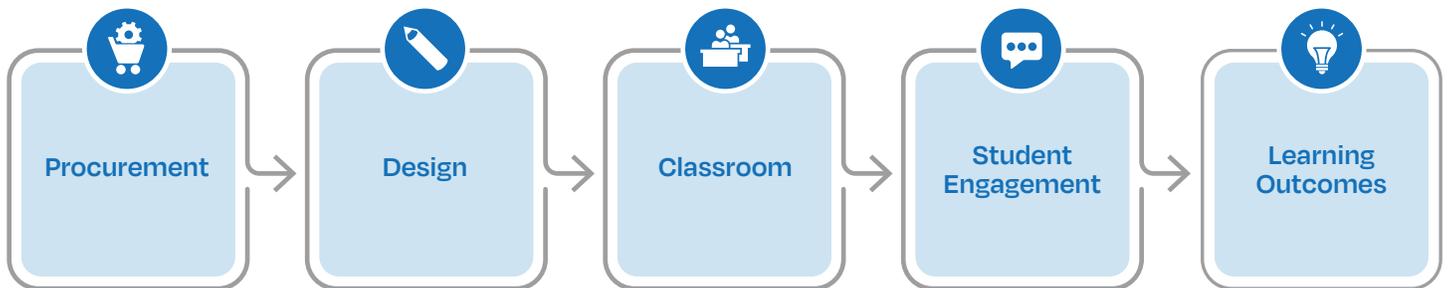
Translating Procurement Into Learning Outcomes

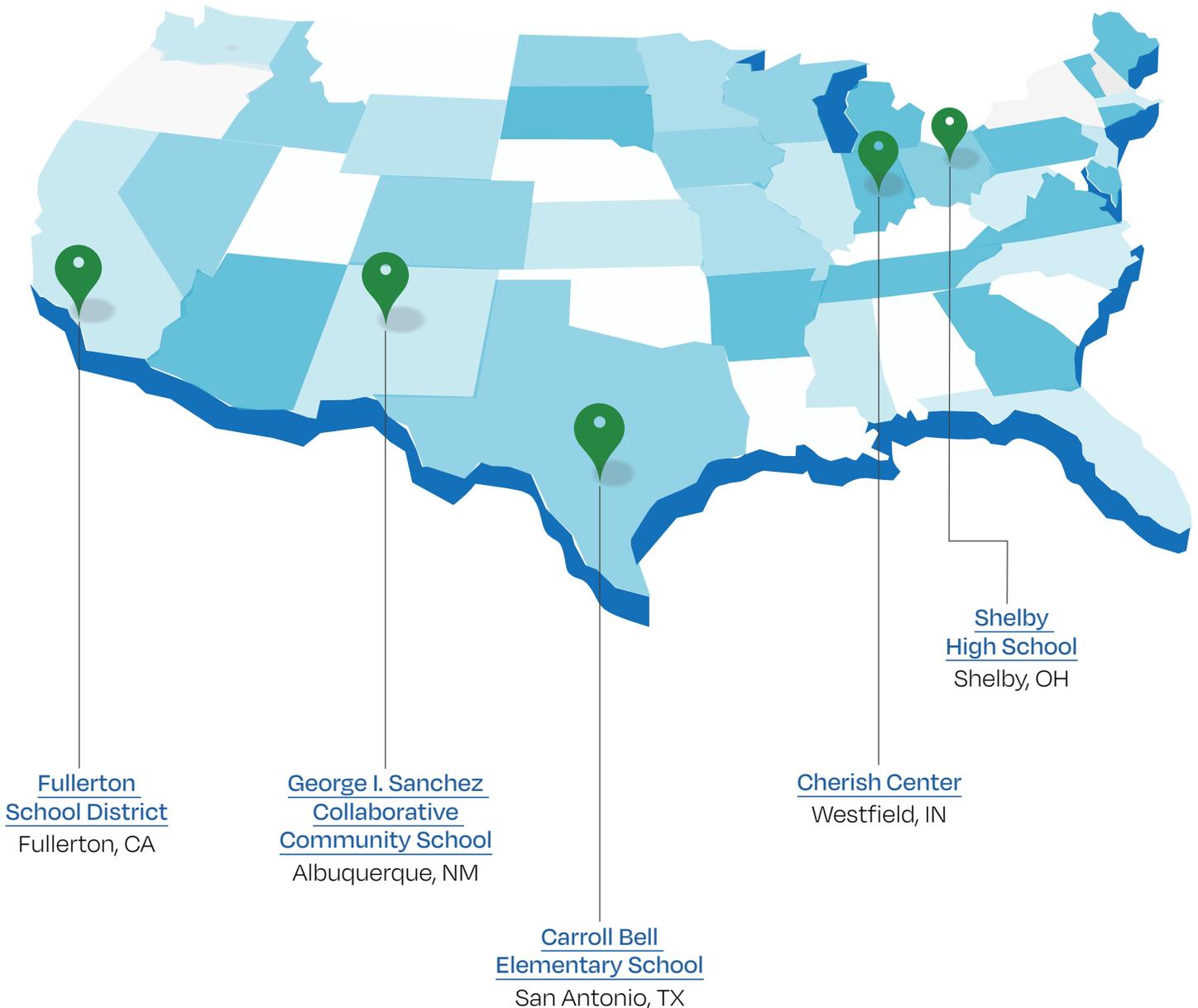


Case Studies and Real-World Impact

End-to-end impact across diverse learning environments.



Fullerton School District

Fullerton, California

Before: Traditional classrooms lacked the warmth, flexibility, and creativity that define Reggio-inspired learning.

After: Inviting, student-centered spaces now foster exploration and connection.

Outcomes: Increased engagement, curiosity, and a deeper sense of community.

Educators in the Fullerton School District sought more than just updated furniture—they envisioned environments that embodied the [Reggio Emilia](#) philosophy of wonder, discovery, and student voice. Their existing layouts and materials simply couldn't support that vision.

Collaborating with School Specialty, they transformed their spaces into vibrant learning studios. In these transformed classrooms, children move freely among zones—a cozy library nook, a science inquiry table, an art atelier, and a construction area—choosing how, when, and with whom they learn. Teachers observe, document, and provoke questions rather than dictate tasks.

Katie Bezayiff, a teacher at Maple Elementary, said: *"The thing I value most about working with School Specialty is they understand children. It's not just a company giving you furniture and then you have to figure it out. They think about the placement, who will be using it, and for what purpose. George I. Sanchez Collaborative Community School

Albuquerque, New Mexico

Before: Traditional classrooms lacked flexibility for collaborative learning.

After: Open, flexible spaces with mobile furniture supported project-based learning.

Outcomes: Enhanced collaboration, critical thinking, and leadership skills.

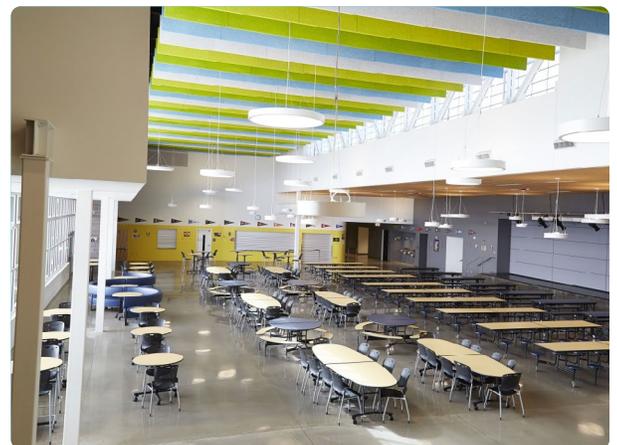
In 2013, Albuquerque Public Schools set out to create a K–8 school designed around collaboration and flexibility. The result was George I. Sanchez Collaborative Community School.

Instead of only traditional classrooms, the school was built with open areas, breakout spaces, and collaborative zones. Flexible furniture allowed teachers to reconfigure learning areas to fit project-based learning, tech integration, and teamwork.

Melissa Grant, facilities specialist with School Specialty, explained: *“We found that collaboration helps students develop critical thinking and leadership skills through project-based learning, in addition to supporting social development. We decided to build the George I. Sanchez School as a collaborative learning environment with an emphasis on mobility and flexibility.”*

Scott Evans, F&E project specialist with School Specialty, added: *“Partnering with Albuquerque Public Schools has been rewarding based on our shared vision for a forward-thinking facility. From the needs assessment to installation, our teams worked closely to deliver the right solutions for the District’s unique requirements.”*

The design continues to foster critical thinking, collaboration, and leadership among students.

Carroll Bell Elementary School

Before: Fixed furniture limited transitions between activities.

After: Flexible seating and zones supported multiple learning modes.

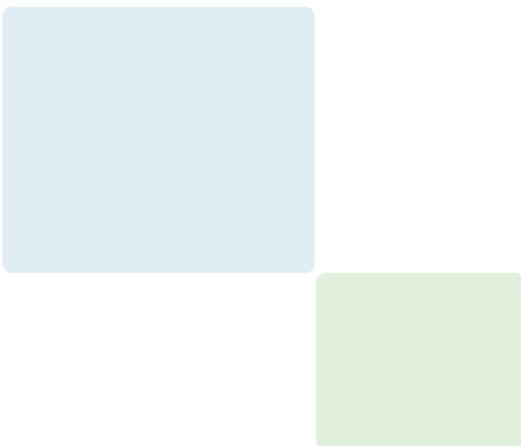
Outcomes: Smooth transitions, engaged learners, and natural classroom flow.

At Carroll Bell Elementary, fixed furniture made it hard for teachers to shift between group work, independent learning, and whole-class instruction.

The solution: flexible seating, mobile tables, and zoned spaces. Teachers could reconfigure the room in minutes, and students were energized by the variety.

Principal Amy Wagner summed it up: *"Now our classrooms can change within minutes. Teachers can do what they need, and students are excited about the different ways they can learn."*

The flow of the day became smoother, with fewer disruptions and more consistent engagement.



Cherish Center

Westfield, Indiana

Before: Cold, clinical spaces failed to support healing.

After: Warm, inviting classrooms with child-centered design.

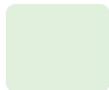
Outcomes: Calmer children, greater engagement, and stronger participation.

The Cherish Center supports children ages 0–3 who have experienced trauma. But their physical environment felt cold and clinical—hardly the nurturing atmosphere needed for healing.

Working with School Specialty, the center created warm, inviting classrooms with calming colors, safe child-friendly furniture, and flexible play areas.

Executive Director Melissa Johnson described the transformation: *“Our kids feel safe here. The spaces are inviting, and you can see it in how quickly they engage with activities and with each other.”*

Now the environment itself helps with healing, giving kids the security they need to learn and grow.



Shelby High School

Shelby, Ohio

Before: Traditional lecture-based classrooms led to disengagement.

After: Modern, mobile environments supported collaboration and project-based learning.

Outcomes: Higher engagement, stronger communication and collaboration skills.

At Shelby High School, leaders wanted a more collaborative, project-based culture. But the classrooms didn't help—static layouts kept teachers lecturing and students disengaged.

Partnering with School Specialty, the school introduced mobile furniture, writable surfaces, and breakout zones. Teachers could switch teaching modes with ease, and students naturally collaborated in the flexible spaces.
